**Call to Order:**

Chairperson Pat Bednarz called the meeting to order at 8:40 am and had each person introduce themselves.

**I. Coalition Approval of Agency Action Plans**

Pat Bednarz addressed the Coalition Approval of Agency Action Plans. Votes were taken on Goals 1-4 and all were approved.

**II. Drug Facts Chat Day**

Pat Bednarz addressed the proposed Drug Facts Chat Day. The Drug Facts Chat Day would be scheduled a half day in the spring. Pat reported this Chat Day would give the target group of middle school youth the opportunity to ask questions related to alcohol



and drugs to an expert panel. Their questions would be answered by this panel. Harriet Dean suggested this would be a productive way to get an understanding of what youth are thinking about. This Chat Day would be limited to Ingham County Schools. It was suggested that middle school Health/Science teachers and counselors be contacted for info/collaboration in planning this event. This proposal does fit under the Drug Free Community Grant in working with youth. A motion to support the go-ahead effort of a Drug Facts Chat Day and a youth committee to over see the planning was approved by those present.

### **III. Teen Court: Mike Botke**

Mike Botke discussed the background information on Teen Court and distributed hand-outs to attendees. Mike reported that Teen Court assists 600 youth per year from the eight high schools in Ingham County and outside of Ingham County during the summer months. Mike also gave information about the Street Law program, Cooley Law Center, ISAP funding (\$39,000 October 2009-September 2010), the 250 families served, the post program survey and data that 91% of teens who completed Teen Court did not reoffend. Mike elaborated on the Prevention component of Teen Court. He reported that 9% of teens who complete Teen Court reoffend while 30% of those teens who do not complete teen court reoffend. He also discussed the reduction of teen petitions who backed out of the court during the recent year (250-300), creating a significant reduction of dockets.

### **IV. Recovery Oriented Systems of Care Grant (MSSAC)**

Carol Patterson and Sarah Lurie discussed the Recovery Oriented Systems of Care Grant which is currently being spearheaded by Mid-South Substance Abuse Commission and Providers. It was reported that this grant is directed towards the integration between prevention and treatment. It would include a full range of services for clients and in-depth case management. The proposed focus will be on substance abuse treatment along with medical care and mental health treatment. Kaye McDuffie reported a Peer to Peer Support model would be implemented.

### **V. Announcements**

- Kaye McDuffie reported she would be scheduling a Recovery Oriented Systems of Care meeting.
- Harriet Dean reported Social Norms funding will continue for three more years and reported Anheuser-Busch was the funding source. Harriet reported the most significant factor related to current alcohol use is if the alcohol user first experienced intoxication during their alcohol debut. Those persons that experienced intoxication were more likely to continue with alcohol use.



- Harriet reported a recent article in the LSJ that stated there was an increase in tobacco sales to minors. She reported however, that 80% of vendors do not sell to minors.
- Pat Bednarz proposed that a meeting should be held to determine how the prevention field can help people in recovery. The time for this meeting was January 26<sup>th</sup> but the location was undetermined.

#### **VI. MSU Media Committee Social Norms Results**

Harriet Dean reported on the MSU Media Committee Social Norm results. She passed around to the group attendee's the work done by MSU students and displayed the two selections that were chosen. She reported that the students completed a high caliber of work. Harriet reported the Social Norm target markets were parents, youth in middle school, youth in high school and youth between 18-21 years of age. Harriet reported she would be getting back with the social norm messages.

#### **VII. Liquor Control Commission**

Mike Tobias represented ISAP recently when he suggested to the Michigan Liquor Control Commission the ending of the support of the sale and distribution of alcoholic energy drinks and that Alco-pops should be reclassified as mixed spirit drinks and that existing laws should be enforced. Mike reported that the Michigan Liquor Control Commission reported back that these issues were a legislative matter. Mike also reported that the legal office of the Governor concurred with the Liquor control commission.
